Draft flood risk program guidelines available for public comment

Flood-MAR webinar to be part of water series at Sacramento State DWR is <u>accepting comments</u> on the draft <u>Systemwide Flood Risk</u> <u>Reduction Program Guidelines</u>. The <u>program</u> oversees projects that further the goals of the Central Valley Flood Protection Plan. Webinars to discuss the draft guidelines will be held in the <u>morning</u> and <u>afternoon</u> of Monday, Oct. 12 and on Tuesday, <u>Oct. 13</u>. The comment deadline is Friday, Oct. 30.

The <u>Sacramento State</u> Office of Water Programs is offering a <u>webinar</u> on the benefits and workings

of flood-managed aquifer recharge (Flood-MAR), on Friday, Oct. 2. <u>Flood-MAR</u> provides flood risk reduction, drought preparedness, and is a promising climate change adaptation strategy. The webinar is part of the Sacramento State <u>Water Webinar Series</u>.

Water organizations team up for symposium on managed aquifer recharge

Tomorrow's webinar will cover framework for One Water approach

Online survey looking for input on sharing water and ecological data

> Virtual conference next week will feature clean-water technology

Monthly webinar series looks at a variety of California water issues The <u>17th Biennial Symposium on Managed Aquifer Recharge</u> will be held as a virtual event on Oct. 5–9. The agenda includes 46 speakers and a plenary on managed aquifer recharge. The symposium is a collaborative effort between the <u>Arizona Hydrological</u> <u>Society</u> and the <u>Groundwater Resources Association of California</u>.

The Alliance for Water Efficiency will discuss the <u>One Water</u> approach during a <u>webinar</u> tomorrow, Oct. 1. One Water is an integrated planning and implementation approach to managing water resources for long-term resilience and reliability. The webinar will discuss a framework that has been developed to help communities implement the approach.

As California State agencies and their partners implement the 2016 <u>Open and Transparent Water Data Act</u>, they are looking at ways to improve the sharing of water and ecological data. As part of that effort, an <u>online survey</u> regarding data availability, is available online. The survey will be available through Saturday, Oct. 31.

This year's <u>Water Environment Federation Technical Exposition</u> and <u>Conference</u> is set for next week, Oct. 5–9. The virtual event will feature the latest in clean-water technology. The conference will offer real-time, interactive events, along with more than 400 on-demand technical presentations.

An ongoing <u>webinar series</u> on the third Friday of every month covers a variety of California water issues. Organized by the University of California Agriculture and Natural Resources Water Program Team, the series started last month with a <u>lecture on water and property</u> <u>rights</u>. The next webinar will be Friday, Oct. 16.
